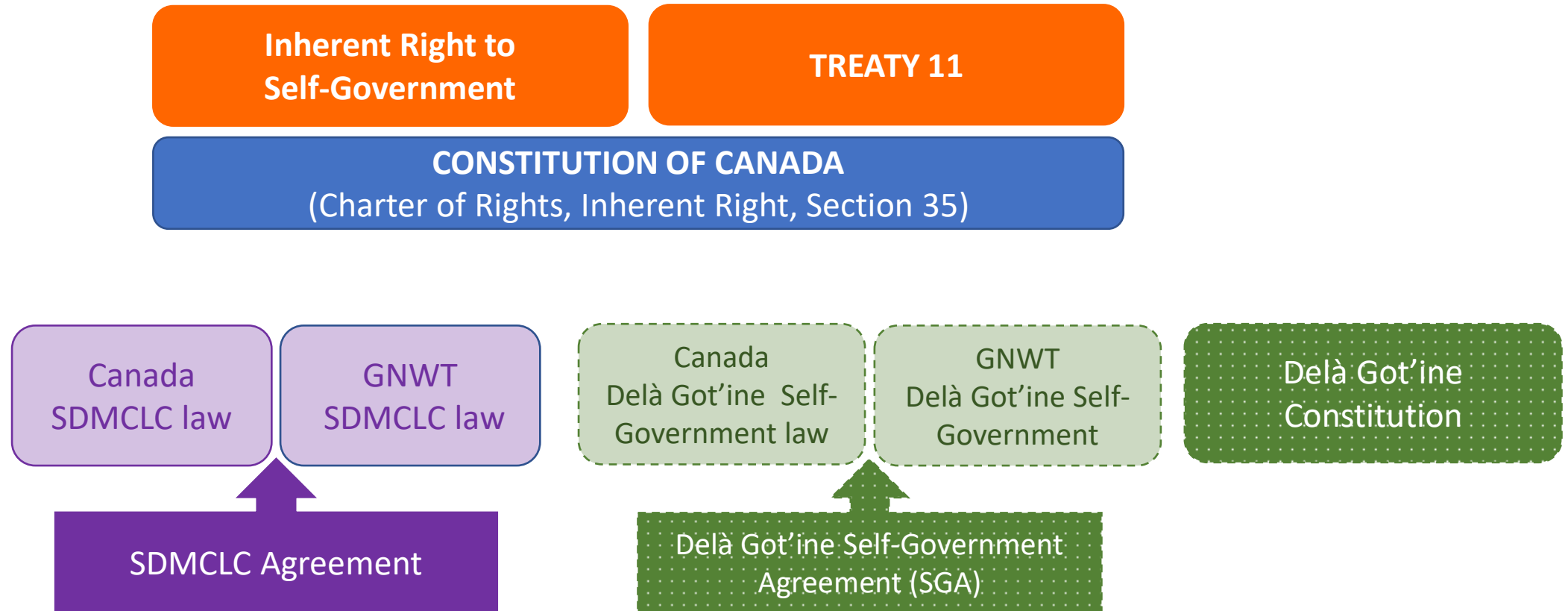


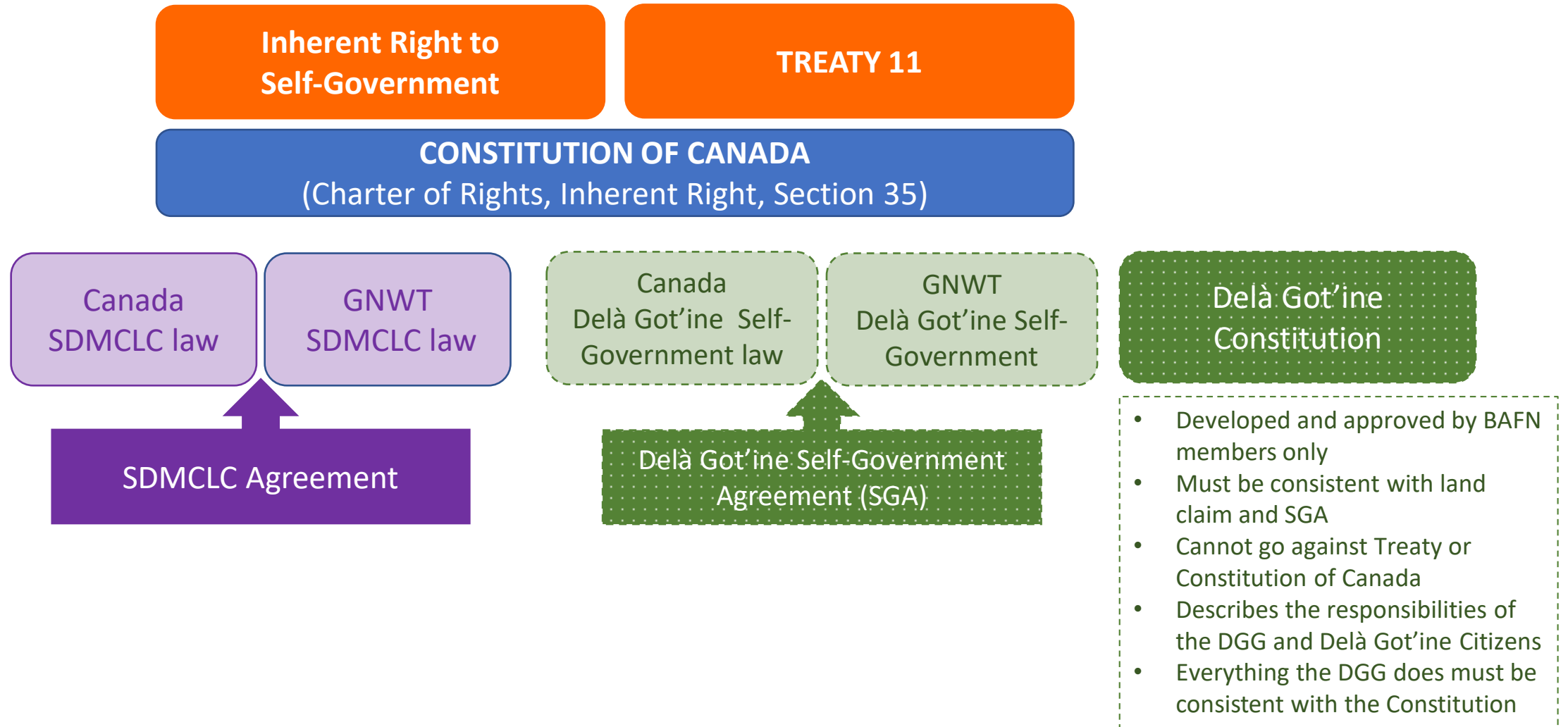

The Constitution will continue to protect your **rights as a citizen of Canada**. Section 35 of the Constitution **protects the Treaty our Inherent Right**. It also ensures the government still has the **duty to consult us**.

Inherent Right to Self-Government

TREATY 11

CONSTITUTION OF CANADA
(Charter of Rights, Inherent Right, Section 35)

Section 35 provides: "The existing aboriginal and treaty rights of the aboriginal people in Canada are hereby recognized and affirmed."

Treaty 11 is the basis for our nation-to-nation relationship with the Crown. Self-government **WILL NOT CHANGE THE TREATY** or the rights of our people under treaty. The Self-Government Agreement **WILL BUILD ON TREATY** by making clear our inherent right to make our own decisions and pass our own laws.

- Makes our land rights clear

Delà Got'ine Self-Government Agreement (SGA)

- Negotiated and approved by Canada, GNWT and Behdzi Ahda" First Nation
- Will establish the Delà Got'ine Government (DGG) and describe its powers
- Establishes a new government-to-government relationship

Delà Got'ine
Constitution

- Developed and approved by BAFN members only
- Must be consistent with land claim and SGA
- Cannot go against Treaty or Constitution of Canada
- Describes the responsibilities of the DGG and Delà Got'ine Citizens
- Everything the DGG does must be consistent with the Constitution
